

Competition conditions Karwendelmarsch 2011

Rules of conduct

Karwendelmarsch 2011



The Alpenpark Karwendel takes in almost the entire Karwendel range and is the largest conservation region in Tyrol with an area of 727 km². Thanks to the climatic and topographic conditions, the Karwendel has an above-average percentage of natural habitat such as primeval forests and wild rivers and contains a high abundance of species: many typical Alpine animals and plants - golden eagle, sandpiper or the German tamarisk (alluvial forest plant) can be sighted here regularly.

As a result of the sensitive nature of the area, the following rules on how to behave apply and all participants in the Karwendelmarsch are required to abide by them:

- All plants and animals are protected! Don't pick any flowers, collect any mushrooms or berries and don't track any animals!
- Listen to the peace and quiet of the nature and avoid unnecessary noise.
- Take your rubbish with you. Only then can other visitors enjoy the beauty of the Karwendel.
- Stay on the marked trails! Short cuts in steep terrain contribute to erosion. Animals get used to people more, and are therefore less likely to feel disturbed, if they always follow the same route. This is particularly true on the Karwendelmarsch for the sections Hohljoch - Engalm and Binsalm - Gramai.
- Keep your dog on the lead as different animals could be living with their young close to the trails.
- Respect the rights and property of the land-owners and workers. Don't walk or rest in the meadows and don't damage huts and fences.

I am aware that the Karwendelmarsch takes place in a sensitive Alpine habitat. I am willing to accept the above rules on how to behave thereby contributing to the preservation of this unique conservation area.
